***Important:** Many students believe that an online course is less demanding than a face-to-face course. This is definitely not the case! Note: Yes, I know some dates fall on the weekend! You can always post ahead if you really want your weekend clear. My goal in setting this schedule was to maximize the time between due dates so the work would not become overwhelming.

Chapter Postings:

There are ten chapters in the text; in each chapter there are four readings. For each reading first summarize the reading paying particular attention to the method and results section then post about something you learned / surprised you / made you think / or was just interesting to you. Explain your choice, for example, why were you surprised to learn what you now know or what was it about that reading that gave you pause and made you think? For each chapter you need to provide a response for each reading. So, on Dec. 29th, chapters 1 and 2 are due therefore you will need to submit eight content posts. Please submit these in the discussion board under the appropriate chapter. Please do not upload a document but rather cut and paste the material into the board.

Discussion Postings:

There are several overarching themes that recur throughout the text, I have selected two of these for your consideration. One is the nature / nurture debate which runs throughout the text but is most notable in the earlier readings, especially reading 3. You will need to post your thinking on this, drawing from various readings in the textbook to support your thoughts. (Give specific references to page number and author; for example, reading 3 begins on page 19 and the lead author is Bouchard.) The other recurrent theme in the textbook that you are to think about and discuss is the importance of one's perception of control over one's environment (that is autonomy). Reading 20, 31, and 32 are a few examples that have this as an important consideration; there are other readings that would also be good to use for this.

You will have two postings for each of the above topics: the first is your thoughtful analysis of each topic while the second is a consideration of someone else's thoughts on the topic. In order to stretch your own thinking on each of these, pick someone who you do not fundamentally agree with and consider their viewpoint and how it differs from yours and why it differs. Saying you disagree without supporting evidence drawn from the textbook is insufficient. You need to always have data to support your position; in your response you will still need to draw on specific material from the textbook. Be kind to each other in this post, ensure you treat all respectfully.

Career Goal Paper:

A brief, three to five page paper discussing your career goal and how you plan to attain these goals. I am looking for a specific plan that is the steps you need to take to achieve your goal.
